IIC INFORMATION

VENUE

The course will take place at the Beach Leisure Centre, Sea Beach, Aberdeen, AB24 5NR. This premier centre also boasts a double sized sports hall, which is equipped for virtually every indoor game you could imagine and regularly hosts national and international events. It is a centre for not just sports but also it has







a themed pool with flumes, fitness suite and spa facilities that include saunas and steam room. As mentioned before it is within a very short walking distance (200m) from the Double Tree by Hilton Hotel and for those arriving by car there is a car park and also many parking spaces on the promenade. We recently held our annual regional competition with nearly 500 competitors and spectators.

CLOSE BY FACILITIES

On Saturday, for the lunch break and possible late afternoon meals, there is a small canteen in the leisure centre that will be able to cater for some palettes, but for those who wish to get some sea breeze, the beach location hosts some beachfront cafes and also down at the Queens Link Park there is a large range of restaurant chains. Slightly further away, but still within walking distance is the Beach Boulevard Retail Park where by you will find the ASDA supermarket that has a small café and also the facility to by sandwiches and refreshments.

HOTEL ACCOMMODATION

The IIC Organising Committee (OC) will not be responsible for any hotel bookings and it is the responsibility of all participants to make their own arrangements. The OC has made every effort to minimize the amount of hotel accommodation required to attend the 100th IIC. By scheduling the IIC to start at 2pm it allows participants to arrive on Friday morning and reduce the requirement for Thursday night accommodation. With the IIC finishing on Sunday afternoon, then there is no requirement to stay the Sunday night unless participants wish to stay longer for leisure.

For those who are travelling to the IIC and require Thursday and Sunday accommodation the OC have an agreement with VisitAberdeen whereby a fixed rate on 200 rooms has been secured throughout the city. The rooms' rates of course vary according to the level of the hotel. These fixed rates have been guaranteed up until two weeks prior to the event

TRAVEL INFORMATION ARRIVING BY AIR – ABERDEEN

Flying in to Aberdeen would be our recommendation for those travelling from outside Scottish borders. **Aberdeen Airport (ABZ)**, at Dyce in the north of the city, serves a number of domestic and international destinations. Being the Oil Capital of Europe, Aberdeen has an International Airport and has direct links to Europe:

Travel to Aberdeen city centre

Aberdeen Airport is seven miles north-west of the city centre, on the A96 near Dyce. Here are your travel options, with links to further information.

By Taxi

Taxis are available for hire on the terminal forecourt. The journey takes about 15 minutes in normal traffic and the fare is usually around £16.

By Bus



First Aberdeen and Stagecoach Bluebird both run buses between the airport and city centre. The timetabled journey is about 30 minutes in normal traffic. Fewer buses run at weekends and at night, so please check the timetables beforehand. **The Jet No 727 service** is the most frequent and direct and like all the bus links is found directly outside the terminal building. By Car

It takes about 15 minutes to drive into central Aberdeen in normal traffic via the A96 Inverness-Aberdeen road. Car rental companies have desks in the arrivals area of the terminal.

TKD Bus Transfers

ARRIVING BY AIR – GLASGOW



If you cannot get a direct international flight to Aberdeen then it is possible to use Glasgow as the arrival airport. The onwards transfer to Aberdeen will have to be done by train, bus or car hire. In order to achieve this you must first transfer from Glasgow Airport to the Bus and Train Terminals in Glasgow City Centre. Car hire of course can be made from the Airport Terminal. **The time of journey is about 3 hours plus transfers.**

Transfers from Glasgow Airport to Bus and Rail Terminals.

The destinations you are looking for, for onward transfers to Aberdeen is **Glasgow Queen Street Station** for trains and **Buchanan Street Bus Station** for Buses. The two terminals are very close together. Buses are cheaper but with advanced bookings online the trains can be much more cost effective and of course much quicker. The average train times from Glasgow to Aberdeen are 2 ½ to 3 hours.





Glasgow Airport has a wide selection of Bus transfers to various locations around the airport, but the one you need to get to the train and rail terminals is the **First 500 Glasgow Shuttle - Glasgow City Centre from Stance 1**. This bus departs approximately every 10 minutes for Buchanan Street Bus Station, also stopping at Glasgow Central Train and **Glasgow Queen Street** Train Stations. However to make sure you choose the correct one at the time of travel please consult the link:

ARRIVING BY AIR – EDINBURGH



If you cannot get a direct international flight to Aberdeen then it is also possible to use Edinburgh as the arrival airport. The onwards transfer to Aberdeen will have to be done by train, bus or car hire. In order to achieve this you must first transfer from Edinburgh Airport to the Bus and Train Terminals in Edinburgh City Centre. Car hire of course can be made from the Airport Terminal.

Transfers from Edinburgh Airport to Bus and Rail Terminals.

The destinations you are looking for, for onward transfers to Aberdeen is **Edinburgh Waverley Station** for trains and **Elder Street Bus Station** for Buses. The two terminals are close together. Buses are cheaper but with advanced bookings online the trains can be much more cost effective and of course much quicker. The average train times from Edinburgh to Aberdeen are 2 ½ to 3 hours which is pretty much the same as Glasgow.

By Bus



Edinburgh Airport has a wide selection of transfer options to various locations around the airport, but the one you need to get to the train and rail terminals is **the Airlink 100 express and N22 night buses** reach Waverley Bridge in about 25 minutes, depending on traffic. The Lothian Buses No 35 also runs into city centre but calls at local destinations en route, and continues to Leith. The Airlink 100 stops right outside Waverley Rail Station.

By Tram



These inclusions are new to Edinburgh since May 2014 and they run directly from Edinburgh Airport to Princes Street (for Waverly Station), St Andrews Square for Bus Station where you can take a very short walk to the train and bus stations.

Haymarket Train Station



Waverley Train Station is Edinburgh's main train terminal, however Edinburgh Haymarket, which all Airport Transfers stop at, serves all main routes North and so you can easily catch all trains to Aberdeen here. However catching the train here sometimes means that due to the initial rush of passengers heading out of the city from the main Waverley terminal at certain times, it may result in you not being able to find a seat on the train initially, therefore sometimes it is better to travel on to Waverley Station and catch the train at source.

If you have never seen Edinburgh then staying on will

allow you to see Edinburgh Castle and Gardens as well as Princes Street. However the online train booking system, that is explained later, will allow you to reserve seats (complimentary) so this can overcome the seat issue if it arises.

Whether you choose to drive or take the train from Edinburgh to Aberdeen you will experience the crossing of the River Forth estuary. The A90 crosses







the Forth at the Forth Road Bridge and travelers taking this option will see the building of the second Forth crossing. Those taking the train will cross the Forth Estuary by the largest cantilever bridge in the world. Travelling by train allows you to take in the view in a more relaxed and safe manner. Driving of course allows you to stop and if the will desires you can walk over the road bridge which is an exhilarating experience. The down side of this exposed walk is that you have to walk back over the bridge to get your car!!

ARRIVING BY TRAIN - ABERDEEN



Aberdeen Railway Station is on the main UK rail network and First Scotrail, East Coast Trains and Virgin Trains have frequent direct trains to major cities such as Edinburgh, Glasgow and Inverness. East Coast operates trains to London. First Scotrail operate the overnight Caledonian Sleeper train to and from London. The UK's longest direct rail journey runs from Aberdeen to Penzance. It is operated by Cross Country, leaving Aberdeen at 08:20 and taking 13 hours and 23 minutes to complete going via Birmingham.

Recent development of the railway goods yard has linked the rail terminus with the new Union Square Shopping mall, cinema and restaurants as well as the Jury's Hotel. Travelers' using the train may want to use Jury's as a base for easy access of utilities and a short taxi ride to the IIC venue. Of course there are other hotels a short walk from the station and this complex.



Tickets for trains can be purchased at all stations but the best, most cost effective method is for pre-paying them online. Like all deals on tickets the cheapest are the ones that are purchased for a specified train journey at a specified time. In the UK we have two essential times for travel; Peak Time and Off-Peak Time. Peak time is generally from early morning to about 09:30, then from about 16:00 till 19:30. This is for commuters travelling to and from work. Off-Peak is times out with those hours and weekends. The train websites allow you to mix and match times to get the best deals. More flexible tickets are called Open Returns and can be used at any time.

Booking tickets once you have established your times is easy. Using the links below you can essentially buy any ticket for any train on any route, but the prices may vary so please explore and get the best deal. Once you have paid, you will get an

email confirmation from the ticket provider with an authentication number. Please keep this number and







the card you used to purchase the ticket. Once at the station that you will depart from, please go to the automated ticket machine and follow the instructions. You will as mentioned before need the authorization number and the **card that you made the purchase with.** The tickets will be printed allow you access through the ticket barriers and onto the trains.

You can see from the photo that the Jurys Hotel is very central, not only for the train and bus arrivals but also for the city centre. Just a very short walk from these services is the Douglas Hotel which is very nice. It has a three start rating only because it has not got a spa, but it offers very good facilities.

TRANSFERRING FROM BUS AND RAIL STATIONS TO VENUE

In both situations the easiest way to transfer to the IIC Venue or the IIC Registration Hotel is by taxi. It is too far to walk and there is no direct bus link to the beach. Taxis can be found at the railway station.

ARRIVING BY CAR



Main Routes from the South to Aberdeen will all converge at Perth then the main route North will be the A90. Sat Nav will get you to the destination. The registration hotel is the same. In the appendices you can find detailed routes from the airports that will converge with all routes North. In summary from Glasgow (Airport) you need to follow M8, M80, M9, A9 then A90. From Edinburgh (Airport) you need to follow A8, M9, M90, then A90. When you arrive you will see Aberdeen pan out across the horizon, assuming it is not foggy!

The IIC Venue has free car parking as does the IIC registration hotel. Other hotels may have supporting car parking with local authorities so it is better to check if this will be an issue for you.

All buses, local and inter-city, will terminate at Union Square Bus Station which is situated in the same complex as the train and Jury's Hotel.

The most efficient method of travelling by bus is to use the City Link and Megabus services. Both companies offer the Gold service that provides refreshments on board the bus. Both East and West Coast Routes are served by both these companies.







THE HOST CITY - ABERDEEN



Aberdeen, Scottish Gaelic: *Obar Dheathain* is Scotland's third most populous city, behind Glasgow and Edinburgh with an official population estimate of 220,420.

Nicknames include the *Granite City*, the *Grey City* and the *Silver City with the Golden Sands*. During the mid-18th to mid-20th centuries, Aberdeen's buildings incorporated locally quarried grey granite, which can sparkle like silver due to their high mica contents. Since the discovery of North Sea oil in the 1970s, other

nicknames have been the *Oil Capital of Europe* or the *Energy Capital of Europe*. The area around Aberdeen has been settled since at least 8,000 years ago, when prehistoric villages lay around the mouths of the rivers Dee and Don. The city has a long, sandy coastline.

Aberdeen received Royal Burgh status from David I of Scotland (1124–53), transforming the city economically. The city's two universities, the University of Aberdeen, founded in 1495, and Robert Gordon University, which was awarded university status in 1992, make Aberdeen the educational centre of the north-east. The traditional industries of fishing, paper-making, shipbuilding, and textiles have been overtaken by the oil industry and Aberdeen's seaport. Aberdeen Heliport is one of the busiest commercial heliports in the world and the seaport is the largest in the north-east of Scotland.





In 2012, Mercer named Aberdeen the 56th most liveable city in the World, as well as the fourth most liveable city in Britain. In 2012, HSBC named Aberdeen as a leading business hub and one of eight 'super cities' spearheading the UK's economy, marking it as the only city in Scotland to receive this accolade.

Aberdeen's architecture is known for its principal use during the Victorian era of granite, which has led to its local nickname of the Granite City or more romantically the less commonly used name the Silver City, since the Mica in the stone sparkles in the sun. The hard

grey stone is one of the most durable materials available and helps to explain why the city's buildings look brand-new when they have been newly cleaned and the cement has been pointed. Unlike other Scottish



cities where sandstone has been used, the buildings are not weathering and need very little structural maintenance on their masonry. The buildings can however become noticeably darker as a result of pollution and grime accumulated over the years. There has however been great success in cleaning the buildings which can result in their façade being restored back to much how they looked originally. Amongst the notable buildings in the city's main street, Union Street, are the Town and County Bank, the Music Hall, the Trinity Hall of the







incorporated trades (originating between 1398 and 1527), now a shopping mall; the former office of the

Northern Assurance Company, and the National Bank of Scotland. In Castle Street, a continuation eastwards of Union Street, is the new Town House, a very prominent landmark in Aberdeen, built between 1868 and 1873 to a design by Peddie and Kinnear.

Alexander Marshall Mackenzie's extension to Marischal College on Broad Street, opened by King Edward VII in 1906, created the second largest granite building in the world (after the Escorial, Madrid).



In addition to the many fine landmark buildings, Aberdeen has many prominent public statues, three of the most notable being William Wallace at the junction between Union



Terrace and Rosemount Viaduct, Robert Burns on Union Terrace; above Union Terrace Gardens, and Robert the Bruce holding aloft the charter he issued to the city in 1319 on Broad Street, outside Marischal College.

On the coast, Aberdeen has a long sand beach between the two rivers, the Dee and the Don, which turns into high sand dunes north of the Don stretching as far as Fraserburgh; to the south of the Dee are steep rocky cliff faces with only minor pebble and shingle beaches in deep inlets. A number of granite outcrops along the south coast have been quarried in the past, making for

spectacular scenery and good rock-climbing.

The city extends to 184.46 km2 (71.22 sq mi, and includes the former burghs of Old Aberdeen, New Aberdeen, Woodside and the Royal Burgh of Torry to the south of River Dee, where Master Wallace's gym is situated. In 2011 this gave the city a population density of 1,169/km2. The city is built on many hills, with the original beginnings of the city growing from Castle Hill, St. Catherine's Hill and Windmill Hill.





SHOPPING

The city ranks third in Scotland for shopping.[citation needed] The traditional shopping streets are Union Street and George Street, now complemented by shopping centres, notably the Bon Accord & St Nicholas and the Trinity Shopping Centre.

A new retail £190 million development, Uni on Square, reached completion in late

September/early October 2009. Major retail parks away from the city centre include the Berryden Retail Park, the Kittybrewster Retail Park and the Beach Boulevard Retail Park.

In March 2004, Aberdeen was awarded Fairtrade City status by the Fairtrade Foundation.[57] Along with Dundee, it shares the distinction of being the first city in Scotland to receive this accolade.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES IN ABERDEEN

PROFESSIONAL FOOTBALL (SCOTTISH PREMIER LEAGUE)



The opiate of the masses. The Scottish Premier League football club, Aberdeen F.C. is home at Pittodrie Stadium. The club won the European Cup Winners Cup and the European Super Cup in 1983 and the Scottish Premier League Championship four times (1955, 1980, 1984 and 1985), the Scottish Cups even times (1947, 1970, 1982, 1983, 1984, 1986 and 1990). Under the management of Alex Ferguson, Aberdeen was a major force in British football during the 1980s. As of the 2013-14 season, the club is managed by Derek McInnes and captained by Russell Anderson. There are plans to build

a new Aberdeen Stadium in the future.

During the IIC, on Saturday 14th Aberdeen will play Motherwell FC in an SPL fixture. Kick Off starts at 15:00. Depending how the final IIC itinery pans out it may be possible to attend if you wish. The stadium is a short walk from the Double Tree from Hilton.

BEACH LEISURE COMPLEX

SWIMMING POOL & FLUMES









The venue of the IIC is part of Sport Aberdeen's Beach front Complex that hosts a themed swimming pool and water flumes, along with a gym and spa facilities to ease and refresh tired limbs. The freeform leisure pool has fantastic water features including rapids and a wave machine. The wave machine is artificial waves created for the swimming pool and again simulates waves rolling onto a beach from the sea. The rapids are fast and furious and the pool water is channeled down canyon in the pool like a fast flowing river which creates a strong current in the pool. The Flumes - there are 4 flume rides at The Beach Leisure Centre

LINX ICE ARENA



Next door to the IIC Venue is the Linx Ice Arena. The Linx Ice Arena is one of Scotland's premier ice rinks, consisting of a national sized ice pad measuring 56 x 26 metres and spectator seating for 1,100 people. An onsite café and skate shop are available for customers as well as Skating tuition. There are general sessions open to the public and skates hire is part of the admission fee.

TRANSITION EXTREME



Transition Extreme is a world class indoor climbing and skateboard, skate, BMX park located next door to the Double Tree by Hilton and a few minutes' walk from the IIC Venue. Depending upon your time schedule the activities including the outdoor high level rope walkway that has several "dropping" challenges to test to your nerve and trust. It is a purpose built climbing and skate park facility that has many 50ft high artificial rock faces and ramps and jumps to cater for all levels of experience.
